Collin County Health Care Services (CCHCS) reports 18 new COVID-19 cases in Collin County, including 8 in Plano. The total number of positive cases in Collin County is 857, including 254 in Plano. The County has 264 active cases, including 82 in Plano.

CCHCS reported two more deaths, a 75-year-old Plano man and an 86-year-old McKinney woman. The woman died Thursday at an assisted living facility in McKinney. Both had underlying health conditions in addition to COVID-19.

This raises the total # of deaths to 24 in the County and 4 in Plano. The McKinney woman is the twelfth resident of the Oxford Grand Assisted Living & Memory Care with COVID-19 to die.

Of the 24 COVID-19 deaths reported to the county, all but three have been over age 65. 15 were at assisted living facilities.

One case was added to Plano on 5/7/20, a 39-year-old male who lives in the 75074 area code. The addition of that case is reflected in the numbers in the chart.

The zip code of a new Plano case is TBD.

There are four cases in the Denton County portion of Plano. Three have recovered and one is in isolation at home. With the Denton County cases, the total number of positive cases in Plano is 257.

10,112 people have been tested for the virus in Collin County. 9,221 tested negative. 857 tested positive. 34 tests are pending.

1,385 people are currently under monitoring (PUM) in Collin County, including 121 in Plano. A PUM is an asymptomatic person with an epidemiologic exposure to the COVID-19 virus. The exposure may be close contact with a confirmed case or with their infectious secretions or clinical specimens; or designation as a PUM by CDC.
