Collin County Commissioners voted to transfer the responsibility for COVID-19 case investigations, contact tracing and daily reporting to the Texas Department of State Health Services. DSHS will begin investigating, monitoring, and tracing all new cases starting Monday, June 1, 2020. As a result of this change, new Collin County case details will be reported on the [Texas DSHS COVID-19 dashboard](#).

CCHCS moved two Plano cases to other cities, including a 47-year-old man (reported 5/25) who was moved to Arlington and a 46-year-old female (reported 5/30) who was moved to McKinney. The removal of these two cases is reflected in the data box above, including total Plano cases, gender, age and zip code.

Collin County Health Care Services (CCHCS) reports 19 new COVID-19 cases in Collin County, including 6 in Plano. The total number of positive cases in Collin County is 1,297, including 397 in Plano. The County has 342 active cases, including 112 in Plano.

There are four cases in the Denton County portion of Plano. All four are now recovered. With the Denton County cases, the total number of positive cases in Plano is 401.

18,065 people have been tested for the virus in Collin County. 16,732 tested negative. 1,297 tested positive.

2,316 people are currently under monitoring (PUM) in Collin County, including 711 in Plano. A PUM is an asymptomatic person with an epidemiologic exposure to the COVID-19 virus. The exposure may be close contact with a confirmed case or with their infectious secretions or clinical specimens; or designation as a PUM by CDC.
