Collin County Commissioners voted to transfer the responsibility for COVID-19 case investigations, contact tracing and daily reporting to the Texas Department of State Health Services. DSHS will begin investigating, monitoring, and tracing all new cases starting June 1. As a result of this change, new Collin County case details will be reported on the [Texas DSHS COVID-19 dashboard](#).

A 60-year-old woman from Wylie with COVID-19 and underlying health conditions died Sunday morning at a Plano hospital. She was the 35th COVID-19 related death in Collin County.

Collin County Health Care Services (CCHCS) reports 6 new COVID-19 cases in Collin County, including 2 in Plano. The total number of positive cases in Collin County is 1,318, including 405 in Plano. The County has 356 active cases, including 117 in Plano.

There are four cases in the Denton County portion of Plano. All four are now recovered. With the Denton County cases, the total number of positive cases in Plano is 409.

711 people are under monitoring (PUM) in Plano. A PUM is an asymptomatic person with an epidemiologic exposure to the COVID-19 virus. The exposure may be close contact with a confirmed case or with their infectious secretions or clinical specimens; or designation as a PUM by CDC.

COVID-19 test results were not available.
